Brother Ken Vance is off to work at Holy Name Church in Manchester in May and **West Everton Xaviers** on March 9th have gone to the top of the Liverpool County FA Premier League.

Ken's last service at St Francis Xavier's Church, Langsdale Street, was on March 10th and he is pictured above with friends and family after the service, and West Everton Xaviers won 3-2 against Remyca the day before to go to the top of the Premier Division. Matt Williams is pictured right, holding off 2 defenders en route to goal.

Ken was born in SFX parish in 1957, in Plan Street off Brunswick Road, was an altar server at SFX, was helping to organize camps at 13, looked after Strada Hall as caretaker aged 17, and then aged 18 left Liverpool to join the Jesuits. In 1995 Ken returned to the parish and for the last 17 years has worked tirelessly in helping the SFX building and Church both survive and flourish. **A highlight of his time was the 150th anniversary of the Church in 1998**: "I remember the pancake race in the street on Shrove Tuesday, the Flower festival, there were activities every month, and that year helped us turn the corner." Another highlight was the **"Held in Trust" exhibition** during Capital of Culture year 2008 when 15,000 people visited the church over the 2 months of the exhibition which celebrated 2008 years of sacred culture.

A recent highlight has been **the form of the West Everton Xaviers**, our local community football team founded in 2010, with Ken as chair and with funding from the Jesuits Social fund. Promoted in each of the first 2 years the team is now at the time of writing top of the Premier Division: "I am very proud of the team and what they have achieved" says Ken, "and it was very nice on my last Saturday to see them go top of the league." Goals from Matt Williams, an own goal and a clinical Rob Edwards right foot finish gave WEX the 3-2 win.

Best wishes, Ken, as you go to Manchester, and best wishes, West Everton Xaviers, as you look to hold on to top spot.

The nightmare of the bedroom tax

There have been a number of community meetings in West Everton Community Council on Bute Street about **the welfare reforms that are coming on April 1st,** and particular concern has been expressed about the bedroom tax and its effect on our community. The West Everton Lunch Club in the Shewsy also addressed the bedroom tax with the help of **Tom McGuire**, director of



Riverside Housing for North Liverpool (*pictured above with Carol Barton of the Whitechapel Centre on Langsdale Street, and Marge Dunne of Riverside Housing*). There will also be changes to the community care grants, the crisis loans, and cuts to legal aid. With all these reforms coming in, the overriding message is not to suffer or worry on your own but **to seek help and advice and support**, either from your Housing Association, the City Council (0151 233 3009), Citizens Advice Bureau, West Everton Community Council, or from your local Councillors (surgery times available from the Labour office 0151 225 2366). Our local Browside Credit Union, now Partners Credit Union on Dale Street, will also be able to help with financial matters. **Chad Thompson**, Engagement Manager of Plus Dane Housing comments: "These reforms will be very difficult for many residents in West Everton: all Housing Associations will offer help and support. So please do get in touch."

Great Homer Street Regeneration

By September 2013 there will be a **new purpose built Notre Dame Catholic College** on Great Homer Street, with the school now open to lads and girls.

The legal challenge period for the Compulsory Purchase Orders for Project Jennifer and the regeneration of Great Homer Street has now expired, with no objections, and the **planning application for Phase 1 goes in next month and should be approved by the summer**. Phase 1 includes the new

Sainsbury's supermarket, the new market area and other parts of the retail section. Then the clearing of the sites will begin and the sites will be prepared, and we should finally see the fruits of a campaign for Project Jennifer and Great Homer Street's regeneration that first started nearly 15 years ago. We used to say everything in Everton takes 10 years...! **Paul Batho, projects director at St Modwen writes**: "this scheme will regenerate an area of Liverpool that is in real need of investment and development. We are pleased that Project Jennifer is moving forward and we remain committed to delivering this scheme."



Design chosen for Everton Park iconic building



The above design has been chosen for the possible iconic building at the top of Everton Park. For many years local people have been suggesting not houses on the top park but a facility that will help people both local and citywide and tourists from far and wide **to enjoy the view**, **have something to eat and drink**, **discover something about the history of this community and city**, **and which will also provide local jobs and a boost to the local economy**.

The big question now is whether the money can be found to fund the building. There should be news on that score in the next few months, with the hope that the Lottery will help fund this long awaited facility.


Everton Park Growers Group


