

## Great hopes for 2015



Hope no 1: by the time the sun sets on 2015 we hope we will have our long awaited Sky Pier (artist's impression pictured above) at the top of the hill. For over 20 years the greatest view in Liverpool was blocked by the Netherfield Brow blocks: now the view is back, the building of flats and houses to block the view again has been resisted, and the promise is a cafe, an events area, toilet facilities, and more (ideas to Friends of Everton Park, see page 2). Or it might take a little bit longer..?

Hope no 2: another long awaited hope, the regeneration of Great Homer Street should make real progress in 2015. The idea for Project Jennifer began in 1998, named after the niece of the priest then of St Anthony's on Scotland Road, Father, now Bishop, Tom Williams. In 2004 St Modwen's was chosen as the developer, and in 2009 the supermarket Sainsburys signed up to support the scheme. By the end of next year there should be signs of new shops, the new Sainsburys (opening 2016), new houses, alongside the new Greatie market which moved to its new site in October this year. Included in this hope is also the hope for good jobs for local people on a living wage.

Hope no 3: there are the General Election and City Council local elections in May 2015, and may there be campaigns run not on petty personality or appearance issues but on vital policy and common good issues. And may many take the time and thought to vote. If you're not sure if you are registered do contact the City Council on 0151 233 3028 or register online at www.gov.uk/register-to-vote.

Hope no 4: may vital local services like Everton Park Sports Centre, Everton Children's Centre, the Whitechapel Centre, West Everton Community Council, Roots Trust, the Shewsy, manage somehow to get the funding from wherever, whoever, that they need to keep going.

Hope no 5: to complete a handful of hopes here's hoping the message of Christmas, a message of hope, peace, and joy will stay with us through the ups and downs of the next year. May we, with hope, get involved in our community, our city, our world: if we do we will be the better for it and our community will be the better for it.

## Safety in the Park, please



Diane Pownall, our new Police Neighbourhood Inspector, is pictured above with Paul Scragg recently appointed the Land Trust's Everton Park project co-ordinator. The Land Trust is a national land management charity. Both spoke at the recent West Everton Lunch Club on November 26th and a key issue was safety in Everton Park.

"Scrambler and quad bikes ridden illegally and irresponsibly are a nuisance and a danger to both riders and members of the public" says Diane: "If you see anyone using an off-road or scrambler bike anti-socially please contact the police on 101 or you can provide information anonymously on Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111." What none of us want is a terrible accident to a child, pensioner, anyone, caused by a scrambler or quad bike ridden recklessly around the park.

Very large fireworks have also caused concerns about safety. The only allowed dates for fireworks to be bought and sold legally over the next few months to Easter are from December 26th to December 31st to cover the New Year period.

Paul Scragg comments: "Local communities are full of enthusiasm and passion and the Friends of Everton Park are committed to creating a successful future for the site. Our work with the Friends aims to identify new ways of ensuring the park is improved, properly maintained and meets the needs of the local community."

# Friendly Fridays still on in WECC, Bute Street

If you or a friend or someone in your family is needing advice on any matters to do with welfare rights, financial matters, or just wanting to meet up and support others and share skills then Friendly Fridays is a great place to be. Every Friday from 12 to 2.30 pm at West Everton Community Council on Bute Street off Everton Brow a Citizens Advice Bureau (CAB) worker is present to help with debt management, energy bills, benefit advice, the bedroom tax, any money matters. There is also lunch and a cuppa provided, a sharing of skills from cooking to sewing, good conversation and the opportunity to meet new people. These are difficult and worrying times for many in our community: help and advice is on offer.

I have heard you calling in the night I will go, Lord,

If you lead me
