This last year 2020 has felt like that for many of us in Everton as Covid 19 came to this community as it came to millions across the world.

But the vaccine is now with us and so let's keep hanging on in there and encouraging each other.



What a year it's been: Monday March 23rd was the first lockdown as we were instructed to stay at home, not to mix, to wash our hands. That lockdown lasted until a slight easing on May 10th. Then on June 1st Primary Schools re-opened, sports events started to take place behind closed doors, and on July 4th pubs, restaurants, places of worship were allowed to re-open. Then after hope that the virus might be on the wane the autumn brought more cases, the Liverpool Hospital Trust recorded in October the 3rd highest death count in the country, and the second lockdown came on November 5th and lasted until December 2nd. Liverpool piloted mass testing, but the virus is still with us.

It has been so tough for so many, and we owe so much to those on the frontline, in the National Health Service, in care homes, care workers, teachers and support staff in schools, youth workers, Food Bank volunteers, shop workers, postal workers, bin men **and women, delivery drivers. West Everton Community Council's food project and their** provision of free internet access via Vodafone and free computers have been great helps.

There has been a deeply worrying rise in poverty, with the loss of jobs, with rising living costs, and the rise in anxiety levels with both the virus and all the uncertainties.

And what have we learnt from it all? Do we want to go back to the old normal or do we want a new normal? A fairer society, a safer world? See inside on page 2....

NSPCC offering help and support for young people

"It feels obvious to say 2020 has been a year filled with challenges, but that doesn't mean it isn't true", says Alex Modder (pictured right at the NSPCC Hargreaves Centre on Great Homer Street).

"The pandemic hit everyone hard, and while our staff were all sent home in March, they continued to work with staggering dedication and commitment throughout lockdown to ensure children and young people across Merseyside continued to receive the support and help they desperately needed.

"We found new, creative ways for our one-to-one work with young people across the region to continue safely, and these methods will

continue into 2021 to ensure we're

here for children whenever they need us.

"The centre reopened and face-to-face work resumed at the end of August, and we've also met with children in schools and homes where appropriate. Although the pandemic remains, we're still developing great relationships in the community, with the West Everton Community Council and Everton Children's centre, as well as with Alder Hey, and you'll see the results from those relationships into next year.

"This Christmas, our Childline and Helpline colleagues know they'll be speaking to thousands of children across the country who need our support, and thanks to their dedication, we'll be there to help them however we can.

"2020 hasn't been easy, but we've turned the experience into strength and determination we will carry into 2021 and beyond.

And how should the future look....



Here's a story of great perseverance through this year 2020. Children can often show remarkable resilience, and the picture right shows some of the children of Faith Primary School, socially distanced, practising away in the much loved old Friary Church building on Fox Street.

Liverpool Philharmonic's learning programme "In Harmony" put on the 11th Birthday Concert at Liverpool Philharmonic Hall in March just a week before the lockdown, and since then the In Harmony Liverpool team have worked to ensure that all 1,500 young people and families in Everton and Anfield involved with the programme have continued to access high quality music-making at home during this so very challenging period.

All activity moved online, with a digital teaching programme for students and families. From September Philharmonic musicians have

been back in schools and community venues teaching in a safe, socially-distanced way.

Beyond the school gates, socially-distanced rehearsals with In Harmony Liverpool's advanced level chamber ensemble Chamber Stars have continued whenever possible, as well as a special master class by famous violinist Tasmin Little.

"While it won't be possible to hold the traditional Christmas celebration concerts with audiences in the community this December", writes Sophie Plumb, "In Harmony Liverpool's young musicians will share their work via pre-recorded video showcases for family and

friends. Watch out for snippets of their work on the schools' and Liverpool Philharmonic's social media channels.

Shewsy News

2020 for many has been a difficult year, it has certainly presented many challenges for places like the Shewsy. However I am delighted to inform you that our dedicated staff team has risen to the task of providing top quality youth work provision for our young people.

During the first lockdown we became increasingly aware that we needed to have more of a presence within the local area. With this in mind we began delivering some detached youth

work sessions in and around Everton Park giving us the opportunity to reengage with some of our harder to reach young people.

Upon returning to action we have had to split our sessions due to the sheer demand. We now run 3 different age groups: Junior club 5-11 years, intermediate 12-15 and seniors for 15-19 year olds. All sessions are oversubscribed within minutes of us putting out the booking information.

On Mischief Night the staff team ran an all-nighter at the Shewsy with over 40 young people aged 11-15 attending and engaging positively throughout the night. This received great feedback from both the police and the local council as there was very little in the way of antisocial behaviour (ASB) in the area at this time. A quote from our neighbourhood inspector said "Thanks for last night, it had a real impact on Jennifer Avenue and Scotland Road: both were very quiet." Also a quote from Council officer Joanne Matthews who said "Very well done over the Halloween/Bonfire night period: I believe you were full and this made a huge difference to ASB in the area. Huge thank you to you and all the team." More recently we have been

running more targeted sessions focusing on healthy relationships, independent living, cookery and healthy life styles and early intervention. Well done to the Staff team for all their hard work in 2020, and a big thanks to Thomas Butler for all his work as a Shewsy helper since 2017 and best wishes for his teaching career. Big thanks also to everyone who contributed towards our Big Give Christmas challenge campaign which will go a long way in refreshing the club.



Sunday evening TED talks This year has highlighted the communication possibilities of the internet, and on Sunday evenings in St Peter's we have enjoyed some very relevant and thought-provoking TED talks: "The danger of the single story" by novelist Chimamanda Adichie is strong on racism or any form of stereotyping, and Scouser and Educationalist Ken Robinson's 3 TED talks on education and creativity are full of humour and great stories. Ken sadly died in August this year but his first talk still holds the top spot as most watched TED talk with over 66 million views.

Lost Tribe of Everton news The 'Lost Tribe of Everton & Scottie Road' project began in 2010 when Ken Rogers published the first of two local books about the inner city district he was brought up in. After 10 street reunions, a stage play, a photographic library tour and citywide talks, Ken's Everton story was put forward as a UK entrant for this year's UNESCO/Jikji World Memory of the Year prize.

Ken writes: "We did not win, but no one can argue with the final verdict of the international judging panel. The award went to the Tuol Sleng Cambodia Genocide Museum which holds the names and pictures of over 20,000 people who suffered terribly under the ruthless Khmer Rouge from 1975-1979.

"I am still very proud that our 'Lost Tribe of Everton & Scottie Road' project was in the final mix and I will drive on to build the definitive picture of our old district in words and pictures while recording the folklore and memories of the 120,000 friends, neighbours and relatives caught up in the clearances from the 1960s onwards."

There are now close on 3,000 uploads on the *losttribeofeverton.com* site that features a simple ABC street search as well as the opportunity to review the 1960 Everton Electoral Roll.

As Christmas approaches, Ken invites people to go on-site, find their old street, and leave a personal memory or tribute to those treasured and loved parents and grandparents who were once at the heart of a community we remain fiercely proud of.
