"I first came to Everton" says Henry, "as a 22 year old in 1975 to help out at the Shewsy: I came back in 1978 as curate in St Peter's Church and lived in 54 Milburn Heights on the 14th floor and used to write "View from Milburn" for the Everton Telegraph. I married Jane in 1979, and we moved to 1, Henglers Close with our 3 children in 1984. Then in 1987 I became vicar of St Peter's and warden of Shrewsbury House and we moved to St Peter's vicarage on Langrove Street. And now I will step down as the Church of

England requires when I reach 70 on January 31st next year.



"The years have flown by! There have been tough times, but I have so many brilliant memories, going back to times in the Shewsy, discussion groups, playing footy in the gym, chess, jenga, so many engaging conversations, to being a vicar at St Peter's and then also at St John Chrysostom's on Queens Road, Area Dean for North Liverpool, groups and services with so many great church members, to the work in our community from the campaign to save the Langrove houses in the 1980s and on to other campaigns (*see page 3*). It has been such a privilege to serve this community. I have learnt so much from my time here in Everton, that people matter more than things (the Shewsy's motto)(*continued foot of page 3*)

Working together for the common good

Working together has been a special feature of our West Everton community over the years and the picture right shows some of the group who worked together to save the Langrove houses from demolition in the late 1980s. Then there was the campaign for a Health Centre on Everton Road, for new and better housing through the Islington Action group, for the old Radcliffe estate to be replaced, for Faith Primary School with its new building and joint Anglican-Catholic foundation, for the fairer treatment of the



asylum seekers in the tower blocks on Conway St, for Great Homer Street to have a supermarket and shops again, for Everton Park to take shape and keep the wonderful view for everyone once the Netherfield Brow blocks came down, for Notre Dame College's new building on Greaty.... As the picture above shows it is about our working together as a community, local people, Churches, Schools, West Everton Community Council, Friends of Everton Park, the Shewsy, the Council, other allies.

There is much still to work on: the cost of living crisis, the scandal of Fox Street, the car parking problems, the fly-tipping, less poverty, the damage of illegal drugs... This working together was shown at the Blue Run on Sunday November 20th



"when a great crowd turned out", writes John Hutchison, "with about 100 pupils from North Liverpool Academy (NLA), 30 from the Salisbury Boxing club, a guest entry team from Brakes UK amongst many others: the event was a fabulous tribute to the memory of Joseph Lappin. Joe's Mum Toni attended again with great grace and race organiser Alex Kennedy from NLA ensured the event went

smoothly. Many thanks to the turnout of volunteers to organise and steward. This event, going since 2009, is a very important signal to the life of our community."

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(continued from page 1) "....that people should be involved in decisions about their community, that we need to help people in need downstream and also ask questions about what is happening upstream to cause the problems, that politics matters and we need good people in politics, that love is more effective than hate, that wisdom is needed not naivety, and working together with others for the common good (as above) is better than working in isolation. Two verses have been guiding principles for me: Jesus' words "I came not to be served but to serve" and Paul's words "Let your conversation always be gracious, seasoned with salt, so that you may know how to answer everyone." I take many special memories with me (including editing the Everton Telegraph!) as I go to help out in the Toxteth area while Jane will continue as Labour Councillor for Everton and will then be up for election in May. Thanks so much to everyone who I have got to know over these 45 years in Everton. God bless you!"

Our Junior club members were also greeted by Liverpool Women star Missy Bo Kearns days after she played in the Merseyside derby at Anfield, which many of our young people were given free tickets for through the LFC foundation.

In October our year 9 boys took part in a football tournament with Everton in the Community against 5 other clubs from across the city and showed great sportsmanship and came out as winners: well done lads.

60 of our junior club kids enjoyed a visit to see The Wizard of Oz Pantomime: thanks to the Epstein theatre for providing us with free tickets for what was a fantastic show.

Nicola Coker and Jenny Edwards organised our "Lettuce Eat Together" event: families from all different cultural backgrounds brought a traditional healthy dish from their country of origin and shared recipes whilst meeting new people. This was a brilliant day with over 100 local people with food from 11 different countries on offer.

On Mischief night we opened from 5pm to 11pm and provided food and



activities such as Nail art, Reiki and various competitions. We had 60+ attenders and the feedback from local police was that anti-social behaviour dropped from previous years.

Our Junior club participated in road safety week with the police and councillor Ellie Byrne coming in to talk to them and listening to ideas from our members around this issue.

Every Wednesday the LFC foundation deliver a free kicks session at the club for ages 8-10 years 5pm -6pm and 11-13 years 6pm-7pm: contact the club for more information.

Once again I would like to thank everyone who was able to donate to our Big Give Campaign this year. Thanks also to the Four Acre Trust for ensuring we had our match funding in place.

I cannot finish this piece without giving a special mention to our outgoing vicar Henry Corbett. Henry has been a vital cog in this community for over 40 years and unfortunately has to retire when he reaches 70 in January 2023.
